On the Friday evening there was a 'buzzing' atmosphere at the 'Welcome Reception' in Norwich Castle. A chance to greet old friends and meet some new members for the first time. With speeches, including a warm welcome from the Sheriff of Norwich Dr Jan Sheldon, it was the perfect start to the weekend in the perfect venue.

For me the evening was not over as I had organised a meal for all those who had travelled from Gloucester, including our Sheriff. A short walk from Norwich Castle and we enjoyed an excellent meal with a lively atmosphere back at the Cosy Club!

The AGM gathering at the City Hall on Saturday morning was another chance for all to get together again and the current Sheriffs present Introduced themselves.

However, there was time to socialise and enjoy lunch before the afternoon excursions which had been organised in detail by the Norwich Shrievalty Committee, led by Chris Higgins. What a wonderful variety of choice we had for how to spend the afternoon in Norwich. Whether your interest was a guided Museum visit, a guided tour of Norwich Cathedral, an open bus tour of the City or simply to spend free time exploring on your own, the choice was there.

The Saturday evening black tie dinner at Blackfriar's Hall was a glorious occasion in the perfect venue. We were 'watched over' by part of the largest collection of civic portraits in England, including past Sheriffs of Norwich.

We enjoyed the musical accompaniment from the harpist Lucinder Pennick-Yiasimi, the Toastmaster Bob Lloyd, with special guests Lady Dannett Lord Lieutenant of Norfolk and our after-dinner speaker Lord Dannett.

The standard of the food and prompt service at the dinner was extremely high, and many 'delegates' took the time to tell me they thought the same thing. This was another triumph for Chris Higgins and his organising Committee, which was the reason I asked them to stand and make themselves known. They were acknowledged with enthusiastic applause.

I can report that kind donations toward the Sheriff's charity appeal during the dinner amounted to £1,152.96 when taking into account cash and card donations, plus Gift Aid claimed. Thank you to all those who donated.
